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COURSE OVERVIEW

This course will explore the impact of psychosocial factors on the development and expression of human sexuality.

Course Policies:

This course is designed to foster and maintain a positive learning environment. Your attention is expected during lectures and presentations, thus headphones and other distracters should be put up, laptops should be used for note-taking only, and cell phones should be turned off and put away during class. Remember: your unrelated activities will distract other students as well! Likewise, your active participation during discussions will be encouraged and questions or comments at any time during lectures are welcomed. Importantly, all comments and responses should be friendly and respectful of the other students in the class. Finally, class will begin promptly at the scheduled time. If extraordinary circumstances exist that require some deviation from these policies (e.g., family emergency), please see me before class. Please feel free to share any further suggestions for maintaining a positive learning environment that you may have.

Note: This course will cover topics – and course materials (e.g., textbook, slides, videos) may contain information and images – that some may find offensive or controversial. This is not a required course; therefore, students who may find these materials objectionable are encouraged to consider alternatives.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

1. To describe human sexuality from historical and multicultural perspectives.
2. To define major theoretical perspectives that influence the scientific study of human sexuality.
3. To explain the significant research methodologies within the discipline.
4. To examine the socially constructed nature of sexual identities.
5. To describe how sexuality overlaps with various social institutions, like education, media, family and government.
6. To recognize the changing nature of social norms.

Presentations: Students will be assigned to groups to complete this assignment. Details of expectations will be discussed in class.

Each group member will be required to write a brief summary of the group's experience. Each member will complete a team charter that identifies each members responsibility and contact information.

Videos: Videos will be shown in class and/or posted in Canvas. Material from the videos will be on the exams. Please plan ahead of time prior to watching the video to make sure you are able to view it. If you are having trouble seeing the video at home, then try watching it at a computer on campus. Exams: Dates and procedures will be announced in class and on Canvas. Students are expected to take each exam alone (i.e., not with others) and without consulting other materials. Makeup exams are permitted only in one of two circumstances:

1. *Preapproved circumstances (e.g., wedding, trip, religious event):* Students must notify the TA at least 1 class day before the exam.
2. *Documented emergency:* Students who miss an exam without preapproval must provide valid documentation of an emergency (e.g., doctor's note).

All exam arrangements are made with the TA. Exams must be made up within 1 week of the original exam date; otherwise, a grade of 0 will be assigned. A missed exam 4 – even one that is made up appropriately – may result in a grade of Incomplete (I) for the course.
